BAILII is a gateway to free, independent and non-profit access to British and Irish public legal information, including cases and legislation.

4.1. Cardiff Index to Legal Abbreviations

The Cardiff Index allows you to find the meaning of abbreviations for English language legal publications (law reports and legal journals) from the British Isles, the Commonwealth and the United States.

It is based in the Peace Palace in The Hague, Netherlands, and its role is to settle, in accordance with international law, legal disputes submitted to it by states and to provide advisory opinions on legal questions referred to it by authorized United Nations organs, notably the UN General Assembly.
