Module Aims

The module aims to offer an overview of the general legal framework and different regulatory regimes for the protection of the environment at the international and regional level.

Outline Syllabus

The module covers a selection of the following:
 Introduction to modern environmental law and regulation.
 The role of international and regional policies and treaties.
 Current environmental issues of major international concern, e.g. nature conservation, climate change, pollution control, and the relationship between trade and the environment.
 Emerging issues in environmental law and policy e.g. the interaction between climate and energy policies.

Module Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this module, students will be able to...

- 1 Critical evaluate the main concepts, rules and principles of environmental law as well as the skills and awareness to appreciate the operation of law within the context of various legal institutions, legal rules and legal principles.
- 2 Apply cognitive skills, in particular research, synthesis, and critical evaluation to legal problems.
- 3 Present coherent arguments supported by appropriate legal basis, case law and policy.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

You will attend a weekly 2 hour workshop. For each of the workshops you will be asked to carry out some preparatory work which is likely to include reading articles, book chapters and primary legal materials. Your preparation will also include independently researching questions set. During the workshops there may be some lecture input and you will be asked to discuss your preparation and work in groups or individually to critique additional materials, debate questions and analyse primary law. There will be follow up work after most workshops to consolidate your learning and help you develop the criticality required at this level. Your work will be supported by the use of the Virtual Learning Environment where you will find relevant materials. The teaching method promotes knowledge and understanding of environmental law and allows for the development of various skills, including analysis, synthesis, critical judgement, evaluation, and legal research skills (LO1 and LO2).

The summative assessment of the module is assessed through an written essay and oral presentation.
