Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

You will undertake an individual research project. Initial planning, support and research training will take place during a residential. An Individual academic supervisor will be assigned to you as well as an industry supervisor, and regular supervision meetings will take place in person or via skype to help you shape your research. Initial research on your topic will be assessed via an annotated bibliography. The main assessment will be a 15,000 word dissertation. The Supplementary assessment entails repairing the deficiencies in the original assessment. Informal supervision contact will be negotiated between your supervisors and you.
