As bite sized exercises, the initial assessments are preparatory exercises for the final assessment. The assessment is assignment based enabling you to demonstrate your broad attainment of the module learning outcomes through discussion of key concepts, analysis of economic argument and data; and the creation of structured and effective written communication (LO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6).
