Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
This is an intensive module taken in the summer period. The students are given a small skeletal assemblage from which to write an assessment report and present a research design (including costing) for complete analysis (Assessment 1). After consultation with the ???developer???, full osteological analysis of these remains is undertaken and a full population level report is completed to appropriate professional standards (Assessment 2). Students will be able to use Directed Study for reading of literature detailed in the module documentation and for researching and preparing for coursework.
