Module Aims
This module critically considers the role of theory/ research in understanding developmental issues and individual differences in infancy, childhood, adolescence, adulthood and later life. You will engage with topics of relevance to contemporary developmental psychology and consider the relationship between developmental psychology and cognate disciplines such as biology and sociology and developmental psychology's explanation of individual differences. Teamwork skills will be developed through a poster presentation.

Outline Syllabus
Historical foundations of childhood. The origins of developmental psychology. Theories of development. Appropriate methods for the study of development and individual differences. The behavioural capacities of newborns. The development of attachment. Social and emotional development, including gender development and ethnicity. Temperament and personality development. Individual differences across the lifespan. Communication and language development. Perceptual, motor and cognitive development. Theory of mind. Atypical development in childhood. Identity development. Adolescent transitions. Adolescent distress. Adulthood transitions. Successful ageing. Topical issues may be covered in more depth and others in outline only.
