Module Aims
To provide students with opportunity to apply chemical knowledge and laboratory skills from their work placement in the form of a research project. To further develop professional skills including use of: on-line literature/chemical data searching; ability to critically review relevant published literature and written/oral presentation of research activities.

Outline Syllabus
Students will choose a practical research project in agreement with their employer. Students will: be guided in strategically planning their experimental work (Gantt Chart); carry out all appropriate COSHH assessments for all stages of their practical work; source and access relevant published work; be required to generate interim reports (both oral and written summaries); give an oral and poster presentation to staff and peers and submit a written research report on completion of the study. Students will be required to undertake a piece of assessed coursework related to their project study.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
Learning: Students are expected to devote 600 hours to their dissertation. This is individual work on an original piece of research. They are required to work independently on their project, to seek advice or practical help when appropriate, with regular communication with their project supervisors. Teaching: Students will be allocated a supervisor (most likely their existing supervisory team) to include one member of academic staff and one member of staff from the company who will provide practical support and guidance throughout the design, data collection, data analysis, discussion, summarising of findings and writing up of the final dissertation. This will be achieved through formal tutorial meetings with supervisor(s) (12 recommended) and other supervised activities appropriate to the research method employed. Individual supervision will allow you the opportunity to discuss your ideas, concerns and progress. Formative feedback will be provided by the supervisor(s) on a draft of the thesis. Summative feedback will be provided as a written examiners report on the final submitted thesis. Support for any additional experimental work required to complete the dissertation will be arranged through the university, to include the use of university laboratories and analytical equipment if required.
