Module Aims
To provide an introduction to the foundations of Artificial Intelligence (AI). To introduce important AI concepts and some application areas of AI, and thereby to equip students with the basic methods and techniques of AI. To provide some practical hand-on experience by implementing basic AI concepts using some programming languages, such as Python.

Outline Syllabus
1. Concepts of Artificial Intelligence and Applications 2. Intelligent Agents: Different types of agents will be considered: simple reflex agents, model-based reflex agents, goal-based agents and utility-based agents. 3. Quantifying Uncertainty. Concepts related to quantifying uncertainty in artificial intelligence, e.g. probability, joint distributions and the Bayes rule, will be discussed with examples from real world scenarios. 4. Solving Problems by Searching. Different search techniques will be introduced with examples and algorithms. 5. Inference in First-order Logic 6. Introduction to Machine Learning. Different approaches to learning will be discussed: supervised and unsupervised learning. Some learning algorithms, including decision trees, regression models, perceptrons and artificial neural networks, will be introduced.
