Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Students will work in groups to develop an evidence based, they will negotiate the guideline question and identify a strategy for a systematic literature search.

Research informed key lectures, seminars, and tutorials will focus on the systematic processes of literature search and appraisal skills including the grading of evidence.

In addition, students will engage in a series of weekly tutorials to complete the groupwork. They will self-assess their preferred role within a team, utilizing the information to inform their roles within their group. Students may choose to undertake roles that work to their strengths or negotiate with their group to allow them to challenge themselves in a role they wish to develop. Students will work independently to grade research articles and then review their judgement in pairs. The group will work as a team to incorporate their combined knowledge into a graded evidence-based guideline that is appropriate for their target audience and fulfil learning outcomes 2.1, 3.1, 3.2 and 3.5.

In addition to the group guideline, students will complete an individual assessment. They will have a choice regarding the mode of the individual submission, this could be submitted as either a piece of coursework or an individual presentation. This individual submission will assess learning outcomes 1.1, 1.2, 3.3, 3.4 and provide further evidence for the learning outcomes 3.1 and 3.2.

Staff acting as facilitators will be available to groups on a weekly basis to provide formative feedback for both elements of the assessment.

Supplementary assessment for the group submission will be an individual 20 minute interview justifying the guideline production, content and structure. Supplementary assessment for the individual submission will be as per the original.
